

LET'S EAT!

Memorial Day Barbecued Chicken

This recipe is a great Memorial Day BBQ idea that uses ingredients already on hand— wonderful and perfect for grilling!



- ½ cup Worcestershire sauce
- 2 ½ tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 ½ tablespoons ketchup
- 1 teaspoon Cajun seasoning
- 1 teaspoon garlic powder
- 6 skinless, boneless chicken breast halves

Blend together Worcestershire sauce, brown sugar, ketchup, Cajun seasoning, and garlic powder in a large bowl. Place chicken into the bowl and coat thoroughly with sauce mixture. Cover and refrigerate for 8 hours to overnight.

Preheat an outdoor grill for medium heat and lightly oil the grate. Discard marinade and grill chicken on the preheated grill until no longer pink and the juices run clear, 6 to 8 minutes per side. An instant-read thermometer inserted into the center of chicken should read at least 165 degrees F (74 degrees C). Yield: 6 servings

Dawn Dishwashing Detergent

According to research done by consumer product giant Procter & Gamble, when it comes to housework, washing dishes is consumers' second least-favorite household chore, right behind cleaning the toilet. One of the main goals of P&G is to find ways to make housekeeping and everyday living more enjoyable through the many products the company makes. Here's an example of how this goal led to the creation of one of their biggest selling products.

For years, Americans have been bombarded by the media promoting dishwashing products that "make your life easier" or "make you beautiful". The "Big 3" consumer product companies, Procter & Gamble, Colgate-Palmolive, and Unilever (formerly Lever Brothers) have spent loads of advertising dollars attempting to persuade the consumer that their product was "the best".

Until the late 1940's, dishwashing was done with soap powder or even a bar of soap. P&G changed the way people washed dishes by introducing "Joy" dishwashing liquid. It proved very popular, making dishwashing more pleasant. In 1957, P&G launched "Ivory Liquid" for those that preferred a dishwashing product that cleaned effectively and was also easy on the hands. It also became a favorite with consumers. Meanwhile, in 1958, P&G developed a bar soap designed to dissolve grease on the skin. The company chose the name "Dawn", as it was a new phase in skin care and was put into test markets in various cities around the country. The product didn't sell well enough to get out of test market, so it was discontinued. However, P&G remembered the name "Dawn" and the premise of what the bar soap was designed to do: to dissolve grease.

In 1966, the Colgate-Palmolive company came up with a new, innovative product that caught the attention of the consumer fast: "Palmolive Dishwashing Liquid". Packaged in a clear, plastic container with an easy-to-open cap, and a striking emerald green color, sales took off. It was further enhanced by TV ads with "Madge, the Manicurist", promoting not only its mildness to hands but its ability to clean exceptionally well.

Procter & Gamble soon noticed the popularity of this new product and wasn't about to let Colgate-Palmolive overtake their share of the dishwashing liquid market. P&G began interviewing consumers to find out what their biggest complaint about dishwashing was. The most common answer was simple....grease. From this research, a 26-year old chemist named Paul Andrecola at P&G began working on a dishwashing product that would single handedly dissolve grease from dishes. By 1972, Andrecola developed a product that met this criteria, plus it also had a clean scent with an eye-catching blue color. When deciding on a brand name, the company remembered their bar soap that was designed to dissolve grease on the skin and felt it was fitting to name this product "Dawn".

P&G launched this new dishwashing product in test markets, first in the state of Idaho. By 1973, the product's popularity helped it to expand into Utah and Nebraska, then soon into Arkansas and New Mexico. By 1976, its great popularity enabled it to be made available nationally. Its selling point was "Dawn gets to grease before it gets to you!" As it rose to fame as a trusted dishwashing liquid, its impact already extended beyond the kitchen sink. In the late 1970s, wildlife experts discovered the remarkable cleaning properties of Dawn when used to remove oil from animals affected by oil spills. It was found that Dawn was not only effective at cutting through grease in dishes but could also gently cleanse the feathers and fur of wildlife without causing any harm.

Since then, Dawn has expanded its product line to include a concentrated version, an "E-Z Squeeze" bottle, a version free of perfume and dyes, and its newest addition, "Dawn Powerwash", which enables the consumer to wash dishes with a small amount of water. The uses go well past dishwashing as it is used for pre-treating laundry, getting rid of ants, washing windows and even unclogging a sink. Now, after over 50 years on the market, Dawn is the number one selling dishwashing liquid in the USA. Incidentally, Paul Andrecola later invented

another highly successful P&G product: Febreze!

PROGRAM TO ENCOURAGE ACTIVE, REWARDING LIVES (PEARLS)

The Program to Encourage Active, Rewarding Lives is an individualized evidence-based program, delivered in nine sessions over a five-month period by a trained PEARLS coach in-person, virtually by ZOOM or telephone through Healthy Aging NC. It is designed to reduce depressive symptoms and social isolation in adults 60 years of age and over. Sessions are highly participative, where support and success build the participants' confidence in their ability to improve their emotional health and maintain active/fulfilling lives.

The PEARLS program helps people with depressive symptoms to gain self-confidence in their ability to recognize their symptoms and learn how to solve problems affecting their lives. In addition, PEARLS focuses on increasing physical activity and social connections which often improves the mood of participants with depression.

PEARLS has been shown to improve quality of life for individuals having difficulty in coping with life changes such as living with a chronic illness, loss of a loved one, social isolation, etc.

Trained PEARLS Coaches support individuals one-on-one to build confidence and skills to:

- Better recognize the symptoms of depression
- Utilize a seven-step approach to identify and solve problems
- Plan social, physical, and enjoyable activities
