"Fire and Ice" Tomatoes


This refreshing and tasty salad gets its name in that it starts as a hot dish (from a heated marinade), then it's served cold! It's very low in calories and can help use the extra supply of fresh tomatoes and bell peppers that many are growing right now!

- 2 large Vidalia onions, sliced and separated into rings
- 6 large tomatoes, quartered
- 1 large green bell pepper, cut into strips
- ³⁄₄ cup white vinegar
- 1 ¹/₂ teaspoons celery seed
- 1 ½ teaspoons mustard seed
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ¾ cup water
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- ¼ teaspoon black pepper



In a large, shallow dish, arrange the onions, tomatoes, and green pepper. In a saucepan, place the remaining ingredients. Stir and bring to a boil. Immediately pour over prepared vegetables. Let cool to room temperature, then cover and chill at least 3-4 hours. Serves 6.

Variation: Peel and slice a large cucumber and arrange with the other vegetables.

Who Remembers.....?

BACK-TO-SCHOOL PREPARATION

For most children, hearing about "Back-to-School" sales on TV or in the newspaper circulars was often classified as "using bad language". While the thoughts of returning to school after being off for the summer are typically a major turn-off for most children, there's still a bit of excitement with going "back-to-school" shopping! Just the thoughts of getting new school clothes, notebooks, writing paper, pencils, and book covers was enough to excite even the most "anti-school" children. It was always great fun to get fresh, new things to start a school year with.



When it came to choosing school supplies, most parents wanted their children to pick something that would last the entire school year, if at all

possible. Normally, a notebook with a woven, canvas-like blue cover, was designed to last about the entire school year. "Blue Horse" was a school-day standard synonymous with notebook paper and composition books. And who can ever forget the yellow No. 2 pencils? (If you ever wanted to get on a teacher's bad side, just show up to class without paper and pencil and watch the confrontations go!)

Most often, parents chose the new clothes their school-age children would wear to school. The choices were very conservative that weren't full of "loud" colors or advertised something offensive. This sometimes drew disapproval from the child, feeling that if they wore (or didn't wear a certain item, they would feel excluded, out of place, or "not with it".

What are some of the favorite memories of "back-to-school" adults have?

"I remember my mom taking the requisite awkward first day of school picture of my brother, sister, and me every single year from K-12."

"Meeting up with my best friend at the front of the school and walking in together - we did this every year from 1st grade to 12th grade!"

"I loved the surprise of opening up my lunchbox to find a note from my mom and a special back to school treat."

"I remember memorizing my schedule and mapping out when I would be able to stop at my locker to switch out books!"

But it wasn't just the students who got into the preparation for a new school year: teachers were doing the very same thing! What sort of things do retired teachers remember about getting things ready for that first day of school?

"Clapping the chalkboard erasers together with teachers outside as we made sure our classrooms were sparkling for the new students."

"I spent just about every Monday morning scouring the ads for book bins, stickers, and other classroom supplies."

"I remember countless trips to crafts stores and teacher supplies stores to make sure I got my room just right. Coming up with the theme for the bulletin board outside my classroom was always a big decision!"

"Right around the end of July, I started to get so excited to head back to school. That feeling was


always marked by getting a new teacher planner and planning out the first few weeks!"

"I remember looking over my student rosters again and again, willing myself to memorize every name before I even had a face to put to it, so every student would feel known and important."




THURSDAY, **AUGUST 3RD** 2:30 - 4:30 PM



What Went On In.....

1970

What were some "firsts" in 1970?

- The first home VCR (Video Cassette Recorder) was invented.
- The first "Earth Day" is celebrated in April.
- Actress Gail Fisher became the first African-American actress to win a Emmy Award. She won for her role in CBS-TV's "*Mannix*"
- The Colgate-Palmolive Company introduces "Irish Spring" deodorant soap for the first time.

What happened in sports?

- Super Bowl IV had the Kansas City Chiefs (AFL) win 23–7 over the Minnesota Vikings (NFL).
- Joe Frazier wins the undisputed World Heavyweight title with the knock out of Jimmy Ellis in five rounds.
- Dock Ellis of the Pittsburgh Pirates throws a no-hitter against the San Diego Padres. It is later revealed that he did so while under the influence of LSD.

What were the headlines in 1970?

- In February, Guyana becomes a Republic within the Commonwealth of Nations.
- In March, the "Expo '70 World's Fair" opens in Suita, Osaka, Japan.
- In April, actress Inger Stevens (of TV's "The Farmer's Daughter") dies at the age of 34 from an overdose of barbiturates. Though originally ruled as a suicide, later reports suspect she was murdered.
- In April, Paul McCartney announces that he is leaving "The Beatles" for personal and professional reasons.
- In May, four students at Kent State University in Ohio, are killed and nine wounded by Ohio National Guardsmen, at a protest against the U.S. incursion into Cambodia.
- In May, an F5 tornado struck Lubbock, Texas, killing 26 and causing \$250 million in damage.
- In late July/early August, Hurricane Celia slams into Western Cuba, Coastal Florida and Texas, causing 28 fatalities and \$930 million in damage.
- In October, US President Richard Nixon announces that the United States will withdraw 40,000 more troops from Vietnam before Christmas
- In October, the Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) was founded.
